What's New at the Museum...

What a wealth of treasures autumn brought! New artifacts have been donated from the Mala Comprá dig, a fascinating project going on in the Hammock. Several of our members helped to plan and attend a history presentation there in April.

Flagler County Historical Society President **Al Hadeed** introduced the archeologists with a brief history of the area. He spoke of the Seminole uprising, the threats to local plantations, and the many contributions made to Florida and our area by **Brigadier General Joseph Hernandez**.

So it was thrilling to recently welcome to the Museum, the great-great-granddaughter of General Hernandez, **Lucia Fairlie Pulgram** donated a copy of an original silhouette of the distinguished gentleman. Other V.I.P. visitors include Flagler County Chamber's **Peggy Fletcher** who brought a group of travel writers from the U.S. and Canada.

A nifty item donated by **Wallace Weeks** is an original ceramic container from the Holden Pharmacy that held cherries for ice cream, complete with a metal spoon attached to the metal top. **The Deal Family** donated 2 Farmer's Almanacs from the 1860s which were added to the Civil War display. Ongoing generous donor and loaner **Lee Goldstein** brought in some medals and FDR display items. The old school area now contains a podium from the Wickline Center.

Former City Commissioner Brandon Cross sent a very special display to the citizens of Flagler Beach to be cared for by the Museum. It includes an American flag that flew in Iraq and a DVD photographic montage of images from there which can be viewed at the Museum. To add to this "Living History," a list of Flagler County troops cur-

WE TREASURE OUR VOLUNTEERS

This newsletter marks the 5th Anniversary of our official Grand Opening in December 2001. In that time, every issue has featured our fabulous volunteers from docents to the Executive Board to our gala committee members. This month we asked 1st Vice-President and Accessions Coordinator Rob Creal to tell us how we gained his dedication...

I am a life long resident of Flagler County. My family was very interested in local history and saw the need to preserve as much of the history as possible.

I grew up in Bunnell and moved to Flagler Beach in the early 1970's. I graduated from Bunnell High School in 1969. I earned the rank of Eagle Scout in the Boy Scouts in 1969. While in high school I became very interested in electronics, and was employed by two different television repair shops located in Flagler Beach between 1972 and 1989. I joined the Flagler Beach Volunteer Fire Department in 1972 and was appointed Fire Chief by the City Commission in 1976. In 1989 I became the first paid firefighter in Flagler Beach. I retired from the fire department in 2003 but still provide assistance to the department and serve as treasurer of the Flagler Beach Volunteer Fireman's Association.

While I was in high school, my family discovered that prehistoric bones and teeth could be found along the banks of the Intracoastal Waterway in the Hammock area. I became very interested in collecting the bones. A friend of mine who lived in Flagler Beach, **George Robble**, and I would ride my motorcycle with shovels and prods strapped to it up to the site. If we found anything too large to bring back on the motorcycle, we would have to go to a pay phone and call one of our parents to come pick the items up. I will never forget how excited we were the day we found the mastodon leg bone that is now on display in the Museum.



The History Corner: *Flagler's Fishing Piers*

Flagler Beach was known as Ocean City when the earliest fishing pier was built here. It was located east of the Casino (near where Finnegan's Beachside Pub is located today). The pier was constructed using palm logs for pilings which was quite common in the early 1900's. Soon after completion, the pier was destroyed by wave action.

In July, 1926 **George Bruner** announced plans to erect an ocean pier on his property about two miles north of the Flagler Beach Hotel. It was to be 18 feet wide, extend six hundred feet into the water, and be constructed using creosoted wood. He began advertising advance sales of pier tickets in the August 12, 1926 edition of the Flagler Tribune. Annual passes were \$10.

The pier was opened in September, 1926. Several articles appeared in the Flagler Tribune in late 1926 and early 1927 concerning the crowds of people fishing from the Bruner Pier. In February, 1927 about 200 feet of the pier was damaged by wave action; Mr. Bruner started repairs soon after.

Meanwhile, in April 1926, **George Moody** informed the Flagler Beach Commission that he had applied to the U.S. War Department for permission to construct a pier. In October, the Commission received a petition signed by a majority of the resident property owners stating their wishes for a free municipal pier. During December's town meeting, the Flagler Beach Chamber of Commerce touted the advantages of a municipal pier. The Commission appointed **R. S. Tolan** and **Thomas A Herrington** to report on possible pier sites.

Early in 1927, a petition was signed by 47 citizens and voters calling for an election to authorize the issue of six percent municipal bonds in the sum of \$75,000. for the construction of a "V" shaped pier to extend 700 feet into the ocean. George Moody and **D. F. Fuquay** spoke in favor of the pier. **Claude Varn** and **B. C. Stafford** sent written support. A resolution was presented calling for plans and specs along with cost estimates for construction. On January 21, 1927, **H. W. Sessions** presented an ordinance for the issuance and sales of Bonds of the Town of Flagler Beach to finance the construction of a pier. The Town Commission waived the requirement for the ordinance to be read at two successive meetings and approved the ordinance on first, second and third readings. The bond election was scheduled for March 4, 1927. A total of 28 freeholders (property owners) voted with 20 in favor of the bonds. Forty non-freeholders showed that 36 favored the bonds.

Early plans called for a horseshoe-shaped pier with two approaches four hundred feet apart. One approach would be in front of the Moody Hotel (South 3rd Street today) and the other near the Casino. In May, 1927 the Town Commission hired Weir & Benson to engineer the proposed pier. In June, plans

and specifications for the pier were approved and advertised; in July four bids were received ranging from \$64,630 to \$71,540. All were rejected because none of the bidders were able to take the bonds for payment.

Commissioners asked the engineers to submit two estimates, one for the original proposal with minor modifications, and another for a straight pier with a T head. Several attempts to sell the municipal bonds failed until December when the

Commission approved selling \$35,000 of them to Claude G. Varn. It was stipulated that he be given the construction contract and plans were changed to build a 20 foot wide, 600 foot long pier with a 50 foot wide T at the ocean end. The deck was to be made of untreated 3 inch cypress, the pilings to be creosoted and the contract was approved in January, 1928. Costs were not to exceed \$35,000. In March, a change order approved reducing the size of the T end, but

increased the length of the pier to 656 feet.

By April, Commissioners were planning a celebration for the Pier's opening. They also discussed the construction of a pier house and rest rooms. It was determined that an admission fee would have to be charged for pier access and prices were set at \$10 for a non-resident yearly pass and \$5 for a city resident's annual pass. Daily fishing passes were 25 cents and daily (non-fishing) access was a dime. In May, the Bunnell State Bank agreed to buy \$3,000 in bonds to be used for the construction of the pier house and rest rooms. In June, the Town Commission accepted the construction of the pier house as a municipal project and agreed to hire **Commissioner Charles Parker** as foreman at a daily salary of 6 dollars.

On July 4th 1928, the opening of the pier was celebrated at a cost of \$320.28 for the event. Just 8 weeks later, a storm damaged the structure and Flagler Beach began to look for ways to finance the repairs.


It was an auspicious start for the Coalition, formed because the pursuit to preserve our area's history has been taken on by so many dedicated individuals and organizations. As projects began

to overlap, redundancy and duplication of efforts abounded. Earlier this year, a Flagler County Library group that had been serving informally as an umbrella organization to coordinate history projects was transformed into the Flagler County History Coalition. Their goal for year one was to produce an on-line newsletter full of each group's most up-to-the-minute activities and history reportage to provide those interested with "one-stop" access to history news.

The first edition of "**History Happenings**" went online thanks to website guru and informal Library historian **Bill Ryan**. That September-October issue, edited by Palm Coast Historical Society President **Debby Geyer** was also made available in hard copy at the Library and your Museum. It included historical information from the Flagler Beach Museum, Flagler County Historical Society, Flagler County Public Library, Florida Agricultural Museum, Old Espanola School House, and Palm Coast Historical Society. Each issue will feature a history article written by a Coalition member; the November-December issue includes an article about Flagler County railroads reprinted from a previous issue of this Museum's newsletter.
