I sensed a deep regard in Alita's voice for the people who graced the photographs from so many years ago. Photographs that had captured a memory for all of us and today, especially for my students from so many different countries.

All 14 stood silently, gazing into the faces of the women, men and children that lived here so long ago. Photographs of people just like us having fun on Flagler's beaches. Only time had taken us from dusty dirt roads with cars with no windows, and ladies wearing long, heavy dresses, and wide brimmed hats to the comfortable attire we sport today, paved roads and autos with air conditioning we graciously welcome today.

Thank you Flagler Beach Museum for helping us experience a journey back in time and to get an idea of what life must have been like here in the United States, in Flagler Beach in an era where life was much simpler, people were polite and respectful and a time when most were quite grateful to live and visit such a wonderful town as Flagler Beach.

MEET YOUR FELLOW MEMBERS!

Happy Birthday to a Museum member who is also one of the earliest residents of Flagler County and Flagler Beach! **Bessie Wickline Minton** of Ft. Pierce recently celebrated her 105th birthday. Her introduction to our Museum's original photos, artifacts and newsletter was through a gift membership given to her by daughter-in-law **Mariel Minton**. Bessie was excited about the project and offered to purchase a built-in credenza when the need arose.

Sister to our Museum President **Catherine Wilson's** father, **George Wickline**, Bessie was a true pioneer in Flagler Beach. Their family, the **A.V. Wicklines** settled on the west side of the river in 1913 when she was just 11. They lived in two tents while building their home and she attended classes at the one room school house (located in the general area of what


today is **Poor Walt's**.) After the family finished a second building, a store for their mercantile business, Bessie's mom Etta set up a library. With about 500 books brought with them from Indiana, they loaned the reading materials to residents for 5 cents each. Catherine remembers fondly that her Aunt Bessie, "had finished every work of Shakespeare to be had in the library by age 11."

Another favorite pioneer story shared by Catherine is that when Etta decided in 1915 that Flagler Beach (then Ocean City) needed a post office, she and Bessie went to work on the task. They began writing letters to everyone they knew back in Indiana and encouraged everyone in town to do the same. In February 1915, Etta was appointed Postmaster at Ocean City thanks to the diligent work of she and her daughter Bessie.

Happy 105th Birthday to Bessie Wickline Minton.

The History Corner

July 1, 1917 - Flagler County is Born

Historic accuracy can be elusive. Memories fade and the older we get, the more we struggle with names, places, and dates. When the subject happened so long ago that it has outlived the people who took part in it, interviews go by the wayside and research is paramount but often turns up reports of events. We strive for accuracy and paint the clearest picture of a time and place that we can.

There has always been a rumor that **Henry Flagler** had never stepped foot in his namesake county. Interview after interview, I tried to get confirmation of that fact and its veracity -- or proof that it was not true. One of our local historian's favorite books is called "The History of Flagler County" by **John A. "Jack" Clegg**. He wrote that Flagler had little interest in this area except to traverse through it.

But it wasn't until "google-ing" the famous entrepreneur for another story, that a clearer insight to the rumor was found. Henry Flagler passed away in 1913, therefore making it impossible for him to have "stepped foot" in the county that became his namesake in 1917!

Locally, we have fantastic resources to be thankful for including Jack Clegg's tome. **Mary Ketus Deen Holland's** books "Unto This Land" and "First Families of Flagler" were intensely researched using court records and legal documents.

Catherine Wilson's "In the Beginning" is the definitive book about Flagler Beach. Archived issues of Flagler County's local newspapers from before 1917 and through 1967 are also a gift to historians and writers.

Flagler County, 1917

In the days leading up to this district becoming Flagler County, a development boom was seizing the area. Just as railroads built in the late 1800s had benefited the timber and turpentine industries, now new roads made more feasible livelihoods of farming, trapping and raising cattle. Land was cleared to plant potatoes and cabbage. Trapping and raising cattle flourished in the woods throughout the area.

Two roads proved to put Bunnell on the map. The new Dixie Highway, a road advertised as an auto way from Chicago to Miami, also provided locals with a growing tourist trade. Another popular road connected Espanola and Bunnell with larger cities north and south and is the renowned Old Brick Road.

So in 1917, Bunnell, just four years old and about to become the new county seat, was the new hub of opportunity. Bunnell developer **Isaac I. Moody**, a St. Johns County Commissioner for the region at the time, was widely credited with

leading the charge to create this new entity. Our district might be called Moody County today, had he not persuaded the assembly to choose the name of his old friend, railroad magnate Henry Flagler instead.

On July 1st, the effort to found a new district from parts of Volusia and St. John's Counties received just 2 dissenting votes in the state House, but passed the Senate unanimously. A day later, thousands gathered to celebrate. **Florida Governor Sidney J. Catts** was the main speaker for this momentous occasion.

To the backdrop of the Deland Brass Band, the day included speeches, a barbecue, and a dance at the beach casino which was really a community center just completed by I.I. Moody's brother **George Moody**. Now Flagler Beach, the town was then known as Ocean City and that year George had homesteaded many acres.

From Bunnell to the beach, residents celebrated their new county. Growth and development continue to this day in Flagler County, just 90 years in the making.

Flagler's Fabulous Fourth!

90-year-old newspapers describe the family friendly pageantry of July 4ths here before Flagler Beach or Flagler County even existed. In the "teens" and early 1920s, county residents packed huge picnics to head for the beach, then called Ocean City, to celebrate the patriotic summer holiday together.

Iced drinks and candy were a simple but special treat at the Casino, an entertainment complex for dancing, sports, and refreshment that provided fifty dressing rooms for beachgoers. Celebrants often camped over and enjoyed midnight swims — when the mosquitoes didn't drive them away.

Despite tough times in the '30s and '40s with the Great Depression and WWII, the patriotic holiday was still commemorated. By the '50s, spectacular parades had returned. "I remember 1955," said Museum president **Catherine Wilson**, "with the high school band marching down Central Avenue. They were called the 'Biggest Little Band in Dixie!'"

Betty Jo Strickland, Miss Flagler County 1960, reminisced, "The key to the celebration was simplicity. Everybody knew everybody else. Those who had moved away, came back to visit and at the parade, they got to see old friends."

Wilson said that beach games and the dunking booth — where her father **George Wickline** often took the plunge — were popular in the '60s and '70s. Wickline also coordinated the fireworks, collecting local donations and purchasing truckloads of rockets to set-up on The Pier. Despite the high risk of burns and mishaps, local boys always clamored to help.

Long-time residents like **Pat & Dan Cody** have cherished memories of the tradition. "I'm 57 years old and I remember fireworks off the Pier forever," said Dan. "Families gathered at homes on the beach," Pat remembers. "Entire extended families would come in from out of state. They planned their vacations around the holiday."

Beginning in 1978, the renowned **Fireworks by Santori** took on the nighttime display for their home county — generously offering twice the pyrotechnics for each dollar donated!

Several thousand people attended in the '80s and '90s as the celebration expanded with musicians performing in Veterans Park and vendors selling crafts in the Farmer's Market. And as always, the holiday culminated in fireworks, fabulous colorful light displays launched from the end of the Flagler Pier.

A Night of Peace, Love & Music Save the Date: October 13th, 2007

Fabulous 4th of July 2007!

Today, the Fabulous Fourth attracts over 30,000 visitors from across the state. The spectacular event is now also known for its dearth of parking and slow-moving traffic. It has stretched Flagler law enforcement officers to the extreme.

Patsy Durrance's oldest daughter attended her first Fourth as a toddler in the 1950s. Multi-generations including great grandchildren still gather at the Durrance home for the evening's excitement, but now they must join the long lines of traffic snaking out of town after the fireworks.

Always beachside on July 4th, Dan Cody no longer gets to enjoy the pyrotechnics as he is occupied with safeguarding the ever-increasing crowds. For many months, the City and Chamber were unsure if there would be festivities this year, but a task force met several times to work out logistics for 2007.

Those plans include a return to the "hometown festival" atmosphere with a single day patriotic celebration harking back to earlier times, with the parade, limited numbers of craft vendors, snacks provided only by local fundraising service organizations, and the ever-fabulous evening fireworks off the Pier.
