Friday, July 4th: Alex and I arrived early, so that as one of the main volunteers at the Junior Lifeguard hamburger booth, he could secure his position as lead griller. Flagler Beach Director of Parks and Recreation **Tom Gillin** was busy, so Alex and I set out to get the booth situated. My mom, **Shirlee Lepson**, walked up unexpectedly and was immediately named official Keeper of the Cash, while we hauled tables, buns, coolers and the like from city hall down to the booth. After I was excused, my mother and I walked around looking at all the happenings. All told, I count six groups working, sharing and playing well together!

Flagler County attorney, Al Hadeed, and his civic-minded wife, Maureen, stumbled upon what they considered paradise while celebrating their fourth wedding anniversary more than 23 years ago. That paradise was Flagler County.

The History Corner

"The Wickline!" AKA: The Flagler Beach School

Now home to the brand new Flagler Beach Montessori School, the old "Wickline's" walls and halls have witnessed over eighty years of education since its 1925 debut as the Flagler Beach School. That year **Miss Virginia and Mr. Lloyd Hanley**, a brother-sister teaching team supervised four elementary grades of local children at the South Daytona Avenue site.

Often referred to today as simply "The Wickline," the school site/park name honors dedicated public servant **George E. Wickline** who helped save the landmark from private ownership in later years. His young step-sister **Flossie Wickline Haines** was one of the school's very first students. In 1928, young **George Miles Moody** graduated 8th grade from the school built on land donated by his parents, **Mr. & Mrs. George Moody**.

The Flagler Beach School flourished for many years, but closed in the early 1940s during the uncertain days of World War II.

Wickline's daughter **Catherine Wilson**, local historical museum president, and author of the Flagler Beach history book "A New Beginning," wrote of the school's reopening after the war ended. "There were no fans for the hot days. With the east windows open there was usually a good ocean breeze. The windows had no screens and mosquitoes were sometimes a

problem. There was no principal or cafeteria and children always brought their lunches. Parents raised funds to purchase an old refrigerator to keep milk cold."

Flossie Wickline Haine's daughters **Beverly** and **Janet** attended their mother's alma mater during the 1950s with **Beverly Haines Hawkins** remembering school days that were simple, safe, and carefree. From the vicinity of the old Pharmacy (today's Lighthouse Development building), Beverly walked to school alone carrying her workbooks while the older kids got on the bus to Bunnell. She favored jumping rope and playing on the merry-go-round and swings.

With the opening of the Lehigh Cement plant, the school's enrollment swelled to 120 students and in 1956, the County added a new building to the north. Connected to the original edifice by a covered walkway, the structure included a kitchen and a stage and so became known as the "Cafetorium." "It was just so nice to have a small school where everybody knew each other," shared Wilson, whose daughters, **Barbara** and **JoAnne** were also students there.

Jessie McKnight attended grades 1-6 from 1953-59 and recalls in his first year "our room was shared by grades 1-3 and **Miss Mays** worked her way around teaching different groups. The place was already very old. The desks must have come off 'The Ark!' You needed a tablet to write on — they were so carved up with graffiti." In the new building, each class had

their own room of about 30 students, and McKnight and Seale were assigned to School Patrol. Jessie remembers, "This was a huge deal — maybe because much of my family was in law enforcement. We were the campus cops. Our white sashes and badges empowered us."

Teacher and Principal **Hazel Holland's** memory of her years in the original building are of the "wide corridor, the spacious rooms and the ocean breezes entering the large windows." None of the staff or children had ever been in an air-conditioned school. Outside, "the spacious campus served us well for softball, use of cable spools, and jump ropes. Although we did have to cope with the stinging nettles," she added.

In the early 1970s, the Bunnell School fire forced K-2 students to come east for classes at the Flagler Beach School and in area churches. Soon after completion of a new elementary campus in Bunnell, Wilson reports that the school board decided to close the Flagler Beach location.

For community use, the City of Flagler Beach recently upgraded the playground and recreation areas adjacent to the school. Once monthly, residents gather under the stars for Family Movie Night films screened the "old-fashioned"

way — outdoors on the big pink wall. And the original school once again bears witness to young students growing together in an environment dedicated to learning. Friendly small town education begins another chapter as the new Montessori School takes wing.
